Welcome to Our New Parish Priest, Dispin John



Welcome, Dispin!

Fr Dispin John describes himself as a team player who wants to work with the St John's parish community to bring people closer to God. He is looking forward to spending time in the two schools getting to know teachers and children. Anyone who has been to morning school Mass in his former parish will agree that Fr Dispin is working hard to bring children closer to God, helping them to understand some of the mysteries of our faith.

Fr Dispin moved to St John's after spending just under five years at Holy Spirit, Thornbury East and St Anthony's, Alphington parish as Parish Priest. He had spent just over three years at Epping's St Peter's Parish as assistant parish priest but it's his life before coming to Australia in 2006 that is really interesting.

Born in 1973 in the fishing village of Muttom, on the southern tip of India, Fr Dispin was educated at All Saints' school by the Montfort Brothers. After school he moved to Mumbai (once known as Bombay) to join the seminary and studied philosophy, psychology and theology at St Pius X College.

Dispin left the seminary before completing his studies because he was unsure that becoming a priest was what God wanted him to do. In the next four years he tried his hand at several careers starting with computers. "I love gadgets and I love working on computers, so I got into hardware and networking. Then I realised it was not that interesting after all," he said. After computers he managed a mobile phone business. Then he and a friend went into the textile business and exported textiles around the world. After this business he bought a chicken farm, fattened up 25,000 chickens every 40 days and sent them off to market. But after four years, still unsure about his future he headed home to Muttom. Despite his business commitments he returned to his study and completed his degree.

The decision to return to Muttom changed his life. It was 10.30am on December 26 2004 and he had ridden his motorbike to a nearby river for a swim. After a while he received a phone call from a friend telling him of the horror that had just struck his town – it was the Tsunami.

His home was destroyed along with most buildings in Muttom. Tragically his aunt and five-year old nephew were among those killed. All that remained of the life he knew was a shirt that his mother found draped across a coconut tree a few days after the Tsunami had hit.

"This day had a huge impact on me and all those who were affected by the Tsunami. There were 78 people from our town killed," he said.

Fr Dispin spent the next year working with the relief team to rebuild the town. It became clear to him during this time that he did want to become a priest. He contacted the Melbourne Archdiocese and arrived in February 2006. He studied at the Catholic Theological College in East Melbourne and spent a formation year in Castlemaine and was ordained in September 2008, at St Patrick's Cathedral, Melbourne.

"If I can achieve one thing it is to try and bring people closer to God. I like to work with people and listen to what they say. I would describe myself as a happy person and I like to share that with others. I think I have a good sense of humour and a great passion for life," Fr Dispin said.

Dispin's mother, brother and other family still live in Muttom, in India so he is looking forward to being welcomed by the many families of St John's.

Education in Faith News

Last Monday Sherry from Aboriginal Catholic Ministry visited our school and all staff and students participated in a Smoking Ceremony". The ceremony began with the whole school gathered around the fire, a sign of oneness and peace, a sign of hope for the future in talking, laughing, singing and making decisions in a spirit of justice and truth.

Sherry explained the significance of fire to Indigenous people. Fire means: the calling of people together, gathering in a circle, gathering for ceremonies, cooking and eating, warmth at night, gathering for storytelling and a place for being together.

As the following prayer was read and prayed by all gathered, each class made a circle around the fire and made gestures in the smoke



*May the Sacred fire be in our minds
Helping to make our thoughts true, good and just.*

*May the Sacred fire be in our eyes,
To open our eyes to see what is great in life.*

*May the Sacred fire be on our lips,
So that we may speak the truth in kindness.*

*May the Sacred fire be in our arms and hands
So that we build up love and protection for all peoples*

May the Sacred fire be in our legs and feet enabling us to walk Mother earth with respect and care.

*We call upon the Ancestor Spirits as we
Feel the healing power of the fire.
So we may connect with the beginning of all creation - the dreaming.*

Learning and Teaching.....



In the last couple of weeks, you might have heard your child say “we had to do a test today”. You might have wondered what it was they were being tested on before the year had even begun! At St John’s we use a range of assessment for our students, but by far the most effective assessment is when we seek and interpret evidence and data from ‘tests’ in order to understand where the learners are in their learning, where they need to go and how best to get there. We call this formative assessment or “Assessment for Learning”. It helps to inform our teaching by allowing us to modify our teaching and learning activities to improve student attainment.

For example, one assessment that takes place at this time of year is an online set of Reading Comprehension questions that are aimed at each student’s level of understanding. Results from this assessment help us determine the placement of students into Reading groups in our learning areas and highlights what each group needs to focus on to move forward in the Progression of Reading Development. This data is then supported by a great deal of observation tasks, analysis of individual and group readings and responses to teacher questioning. We understand the importance of using a range of different findings to determine the student’s developmental stage.

Another use of assessment at this time of year is to determine what **Literacy Intervention** is required for our students with additional needs. This may include participation in

- Reading Recovery,
- Enhancing Reading Intervention Knowledge (ERIK) focus groups,
- Oral language support,
- Phonological Early Reading Intervention (PERI) focus groups
- English as an Additional Language (EAL) support,
- Group Reading & Rereading Easy Appropriate texts Daily (GRREAD) focus groups to improve reading fluency,
- Toe-By-Toe reading program
- Extension Writing groups
- or a tailored one-to-one reading program for specific needs.

A great deal of planning and teacher knowledge is used to determine the learning needs of our students. We are fortunate to work in a small environment where we know our students well and work collaboratively as teachers, supported by our fabulous Learning Support Officers (LSOs) to continuously improve outcomes for all of our students. I look forward to sharing more of our learning as the year progresses!

Welcome to Year 3/4 2017. Our whole school overarching word is "Grow". We are looking forward to watching your students develop and grow across the curriculum throughout the year. The learning areas will be called 3/4 KC, 3/4 EB and 3/4 RF. Rosemary Vastbinder will be replacing Kellie Cumming (mathematics release) on Tuesdays. In Term One, our inquiry unit will be focusing on Identity - (Me in My Community - Where do I belong?) We will be examining this through the Humanities (Civics and Citizenship) and Religious Education (Making Choices/Reconciliation) curriculum. Student learning will occur in a combination of class groups, small groups and ability groupings depending on the task. This semester we will run a rotation program on a Tuesday and specialist program on a Wednesday. Library will be on Friday.

Religious Education

MAKING CHOICES

Students will explore how to build a positive relationship with God, with self, with others, and with the whole of creation. Students will learn about the freedom of choice given to them by God. They will examine the belief that freedom of choice also involves being responsible for the consequences of their choices. Students will be investigating choices Jesus made as well as the positive impacts of other people in today's society. Reflecting on these examples, students will identify ways they can make positive choices.


LENT

In this unit students explore the seasons of Lent and Easter as a journey of Christian hope. The students will learn about the symbols, colours, texts and events of Easter and what they mean. Throughout the Lenten journey students are supported to take on acts of service and hope. Students will examine the events of Holy Week and Easter.

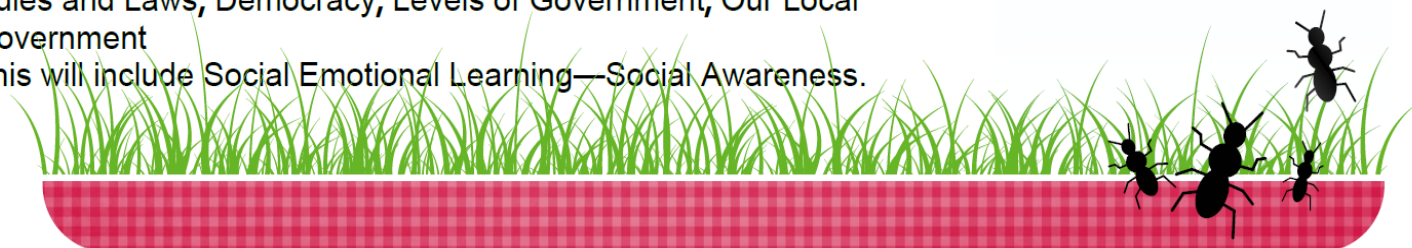
Humanities: Civics & Citizenship and Social Emotional Learning

In Civics and Citizenship, we will be investigating laws, rules, democracy and government levels. Our focuses for the term will be: Rules and Laws, Democracy, Levels of Government, Our Local Government

This will include Social Emotional Learning—Social Awareness.

Literacy

In Term 1 writing, we will be looking at Persuasive writing. Students will learn effective persuasive techniques and structures to make their writing more compelling to their audience. Students will be exploring how to use the writing traits “word choice”, “voice” and “organisation” in order to write effective persuasive pieces. In reading groups, students will engage in a range of comprehension, spelling and handwriting activities. We will be further utilising Reading Eggspress through weekly comprehension tasks individually set for students to complete during reading rotations. We will also be having additional focus groups on inferencing, looking at what it means “to read between the lines” and gain an understanding of a text which goes beyond the literal meaning.

Mathematics

Through independent, small and large group activities students will explore the following concepts;

Place Value

Recognising, modelling and ordering numbers to at least 10,000. Understanding that the position of the digit determines the value of the number. Understanding that place value is a base ten system. Understand that numbers can be written in numeric, words and expanded notation.

Length and Perimeter

Estimate, order, compare and measure lengths using scaled instruments. Convert between units of millimetres, centimetres and metres. Calculate the perimeter of regular and irregular two dimensional shapes.

Data

Investigate and interpret data by posing a question, collecting information, representing the information in a graph and or table and analysing the results.

Addition and Subtraction

Develop increasingly efficient mental strategies for addition and subtraction facts for single digit numbers including friends of ten, doubling and near doubling. Demonstrate the connection between addition and subtraction. Solve problems using efficient written strategies such as the use of number lines, breaking numbers into parts and compensation. Use estimation and rounding as a way of checking if you are close to the exact answer.

Home Learning

-We encourage daily reading at home. This should include both independent reading and reading aloud. Furthermore, discussions about the characters and storyline can help students make connections and develop deeper understandings of what they are reading. Students should keep a record of what book they are reading and a signature from an adult in their diaries.

-Ongoing mathematics tasks will be set for students to complete at home. These tasks will relate to what has been covered in class and assist students in consolidating what they have learnt.

-Reading Eggspress practice at home will assist students develop their literacy skills. The program provides a library of books, lessons and English skills practice.

Year Five/Six Term One Newsletter

Welcome back to the 2017 school year. We are looking forward to a wonderful year where all students will flourish and grow.

Tom Jackson and Monica O'Shannassy are named as the class teachers. Beth Johnson will be teaching 5/6TJ when Tom Jackson is teaching PE on Tuesday and Wednesday afternoons to other classes in the school and 5/6MO on Thursday when Monica is released for

her Religious Education Co-ordinator role. We consider ourselves to be the senior teaching team supported by Connie Pearse as the Learning Support Officer in the learning area.



Our first term unit of learning called "I Was Here," has a Civics and Citizenship focus. Students will be exploring the values that underpin Australian democracy and the key institutions and levels of government. Students will discuss contemporary issues and identify possible solutions.

This learning will include exploring Catholic Social Teaching Principles of Human Dignity and Participation as we all strive to build a more just world, both globally and locally.

Students will also be learning about the liturgical season of Lent, which commences on 1st March and Holy Week which takes place during the first term school holidays.

Please note in your calendars: Year Six Camp 14th - 18th March

Year Five Camp 26th & 27th April

All other school dates will be in the St John's School Calendar and regularly in the school newsletter.

English

This term, the senior students will look to develop their reading, speaking and listening and writing skills through a variety of activities and programs.

Through our literacy rotations, which we will set up in the coming weeks students will be exposed to a variety of texts types, word study activities (vocabulary, spelling, punctuation and grammar), and online activities (BTN study and Reading Eggs). In teacher focus groups students will discuss ideas and share their opinions relating to various topics and texts. In reading and responding to texts, students will be making connections to their own life and knowledge. Specific comprehension skills will be targeted through the various texts and activities students are learning throughout the term.

Home Learning

Details relating to the 5/6 home learning expectations will be outlined to students and families in the coming weeks. At this stage we hope all students are reading nightly, for approximately 15-20 minutes. This reading is to be recorded in their diary and signed on a Thursday night before diaries are checked on a Friday.

Maths

The following curriculum will be taught this term:

Whole numbers: Place Value

Geometry 2D Space

Measurement: Length and perimeter

Fractions

Statistics

Number patterns and equations

Timetable

Specialist classes of Performing Arts and Italian are on Wednesday,
Students will need to wear sports uniform on Fridays and Tuesday (5/6TJ) and Wednesday (5/6MO).
Library borrowing will take place on Mondays.
