#### Tips for Promoting a Growth Mindset in your Child/Children



The concept of a **growth mindset** was developed by psychologist Carol Dweck. According to Dweck, a mindset is a self-perception or "self-theory" that people hold about themselves. A growth mindset is the underlying belief that abilities can be developed through effort and practice. Children with a growth mindset persist in the face of challenges because they understand that effort and hard work can change ability and intelligence. A fixed mindset is the belief that intelligence is static, and cannot be changed. When children have a fixed mindset, they tend to give up easily when they encounter obstacles, because they believe that they don't have what it takes to learn hard things.

Here are some tips for promoting a growth mindset:

Help children understand that the brain works like a muscle, that can only grow through hard work, determination, and lots and lots of practice.

**Don't tell students they are smart, gifted, or talented,** since this implies that they were born with the knowledge, and does not encourage effort and growth.

**Praise the process.** It's effort, hard work, perseverance and practice that allow children to achieve their true potential.

**Don't praise the results.** Test results are rigid ways of measuring learning and knowledge. It may limit the growth that would otherwise be tapped. It should never be about getting the 'correct' answer, but to understand the topic at a fundamental, deep level, and want to learn more.



THE BIGGER THE CHALLENGE

THE BIGGER THE OPPORTUNITY TO GROW.

Take risks. When the task is challenging is usually when "the big learning" occurs.

**Learn from mistakes.** Children sometimes learn the most when they fail. Let them know that mistakes are a big part of the learning process. There is nothing like the feeling of struggling through a very difficult problem, only to finally break through and solve it! The harder the problem, the more satisfying it is to find the solution.

**Accept feedback and criticism.** Use feedback as a supportive element in the learning process and apply new strategies as a result of feedback.

#### Learning to manage feelings

Children's feelings are often intense. They can be quickly taken over by feelings of excitement, frustration, fear or joy. When feelings take over children's behaviour, they can find it difficult to manage without adult support. This is why learning how to recognise and manage feelings is a very important part of children's social and emotional development.

Understanding that all sorts of feelings are normal, that they can be named, and that there are ways of handling them are the first things children need to learn about feelings. Understanding that feelings affect behaviour, and being able to recognise how this happens are important steps for learning to manage feelings.

#### How parents and carers can help children manage feelings

#### 1. Notice feelings

Before we can learn how to control feelings, we first have to notice them. You can help your children notice feelings by noticing them yourself and giving them labels: happy, sad, excited, frustrated, angry, embarrassed, surprised, etc. Giving feelings names helps to make them more manageable for children.

Learning to pay attention to how they are feeling helps children understand that they can have emotions without being controlled by them.

#### 2. Talk about everyday feelings

Talking with children about what it's like when you're angry, sad, nervous or excited helps them find ways to express feelings without having to act them out through negative behaviours. Children learn these skills best when they hear adults and peers using words to express feelings and when they are encouraged to use words like this too.

Learning to name feelings helps children find ways to express them without having to act them out.

#### 3. Create space for talking about difficult feelings

Help children to separate a feeling from a difficult reaction by helping them name it. Being able to say or think, "I am feeling angry," means that children don't have to act really angry before anyone takes notice. It allows them to choose how they will respond. The same idea works with other difficult feelings like nervousness or fear.

Learning to cope with feelings helps children manage their behaviour at school and at home. It helps them learn better, relate to others better and feel better about themselves.

#### Things to remember

learning skills for managing feelings takes practise

noticing and naming feelings comes first

talking about everyday feelings in normal conversations makes it easier when the difficult feelings come up

talking about difficult feelings is usually best tried after the feelings have calmed down a bit, and when children, parents and carers are feeling relaxed.

#### Things to try at home

Use feeling words when you talk with children about everyday situations: "You scored a goal! How exciting was that!"..... or: "It's pretty disappointing that Kati can't play with you today."

Invite children to describe their own feelings: "I'm feeling pretty nervous about going to the dentist. How about you?".....or "How did you feel when...?"

## Welcome To Term Two in Prep

Welcome back to term 2. I hope you all had a restful break and are ready for a full term of learning. This will be another busy term so I thank you in advance for your support with your child's learning at home.

Readers will continue to be sent home each night. A reminder that these should be easy texts and the focus should be on talking about what is happening and making connections to the book. Last term we introduced Reading Eggs and Mathletics so I encourage you to use those at home a few times each week. We will still be using them in class.

Some reminders for this term:

- Students do not need to wear hats in term 2 and 3.
- Library will remain on a Wednesday.
- Art and ICT will remain on a Friday.
- The preps will be hosting assembly in week 4 this term (Monday May 8<sup>th</sup>).

## liTeracy

Each morning we begin with Reading and Writing and it would be great to have some parent helpers to assist with our groups. Please speak to Ange Crowe if you would like to assist and have not completed the parent helpers course. acrowe@sjmitcham.catholic.edu.au

If you have completed the course please see me to arrange a suitable time on either Monday, Thursday or Friday mornings.

This term we will continue to focus on:

- Pre-reading questions
- Recalling events from the text
- Identifying all letters and sounds of the alphabet
- Reading short, predictable texts
- Identifying rhyme and patterns in words
- Writing familiar words (high frequency)
- Correctly forming uppercase and lowercase letters and
- starting in the correct position
- Correctly holding our pencil
- Using and understanding full stops and capital letters







## Investigations - History

This term the preps will be reflecting on their own personal journey as part of our History unit. They will be learning vocabulary such as past, present and future and creating chronological timelines of familiar events. They will be learning to identify significant people, places and events in their own lives and how this has shaped their personal history. Exploring continuity and change over time will also feature in this historical unit. Our history unit will also link in with our Religious Education units this term.



#### Social and EcroTional Learning

This term as part of SEL we will explore Self Management. This will involve learning about positive strengths, seeking help and positive coping. This term we will begin Circle Time sessions to further help us explore this. In SEL we engage in a number of role plays, games, problem-solving activities and team building activities.

## Religious Education

Students will begin the term learning about the Easter story and the events that followed shortly after such as what happened on the road to Emmaus and the story of Doubting Thomas. They will also explore what happened at Pentecost and learn about the importance of the Holy Spirit.

## Maths

Each day we will work on our fluency with counting and place value so we can understand numbers more. In addition to this, we will explore 5 units in Maths this term.

#### Addition:

Students will become fluent at multiple ways to make 10 (friends of 10), represent real life situations of adding, understand the role of zero when adding and learn to count on rather than counting the whole collection.

#### Positional Language:

Students will become familiar with language that is used to describe the location of objects and type of movement. They will begin to follow and give simple instructions to familiar locations using this vocabulary.

#### Patterns:

Students will sort and classify objects and explain their reasoning. They will also copy and continue various patterns made with objects and drawings and articulate how/why it is a pattern.

#### Multiplication (Groups):

Students will begin to link addition with groups and represent situations involving groups of the same size. They will understand that that some groups are equal while some have left overs.

#### Time:


Students will connect days of the week to familiar events and compare and order the duration of events using the everyday language of time. They will become familiar with a range of vocabulary associated with seasons and the yearly calendar.

#### Welcome to Term Two!

Welcome back to school. We hope you all had an enjoyable holiday and Easter and are ready for another wonderful term with great learning taking place.

We once again welcome parent helpers. We appreciate the time you give up to support us in our learning space and it would be great to see that continue for our Reading Group rotations. These rotations will be held on Monday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. Tuesday will have a spelling focus. Remember it is never too late to be a classroom helper. Please speak to Ange if you would like to assist us.

Just a reminder that students do not need to wear hats in term two. Talk Time will take place on a Thursday this term.

#### English

Reading Eggs has been a consistent reading group rotation in term one. In term two this rotation will continue but we would still love to see students using Reading Eggs at home to improve their reading, comprehension and decoding skills. It would be great if students could spend at least 15 minutes three times a week to continue to develop their skills.

It is important that students are reading their readers every afternoon/evening. Remember these readers come home as a seen text and should be easy for your child. This will help the experience to be a fun one for you and your child. At times, readers might not be placed in the correct coloured box and your child may bring a book home that is too easy or hard. If this happens, please read the text to your child or you can read another book that you have at home. In English the students will:

- Recognise short vowels, common long vowels and consonant digraphs and consonant blends
- Explore words that represent people, places and things (nouns, including pronouns), happenings and states (verbs), qualities (adjectives) and details such as when, where and how (adverbs)
- Students will know the six plus one traits of effective writing including ideas, organisation, voice, word choice, sentence fluency, conventions and presentation.
- They will use strategies such as picture cues, sounding out, chunking, reading on and reading back to decode new words.
- Independently create texts for a range of purposes (e.g. recount, imaginative, informative and persuasive). They will publish texts in print and multimodal forms, selecting an appropriate text structure for the purpose and audience.
- Recognise that capital letters signal proper nouns and commas are used to separate items in lists
- Understand that simple connections can be made between ideas by using a compound sentence with two or more clauses usually linked by a coordinating conjunction

There will also be more of a focus on handwriting this term. We will have consistent handwriting sessions where we will model writing words and sentences legibly using upper and lower case letters. Correct formation, directionality, pencil grip and body position is the key to writing legibly and fluently. If you have any questions about this or would like some alphabet strips to support your child at home, please let us know.

#### Mathematics

It was great to see so many students using Mathletics at home last term. We would love to see each student using Mathletics at least two to three times per week to develop their fluency and understanding. Remember, we assign tasks that complement what we are learning in the classroom, so using Mathletics will assist your child to consolidate their learning and make connections. If you have any questions about this, wonderings about the tasks assigned, or you would like more activities for your child please do not hesitate to make contact with us- we would love to help!

This term we will be exploring five core topics: Addition & Subtraction, Data Representation, Time, 3D Objects and Pattern & Algebra. Through tuning in activities and small and whole class focus teaching groups the students will explore many key concepts in these topics.

In Addition & Subtraction, students will be able to:

- Recognise and explain the connection between addition and subtraction.
- Represent and solve simple addition and subtraction problems using a range of strategies including counting on, partitioning, rearranging parts, doubles facts and tens facts.

In Data Representation, students will be able to:

- Ask questions to find out information.
- Collect and record information in different ways.

In Time, students will be able to:

- Tell the time to the hour, half past, quarter past and quarter to
- Name and order months and seasons
- Describe duration using months, weeks, days and hours and identify the date, using a calendar

In 3D Objects, students will be able to:

 Identify and classify 3D objects according to distinguishable features including faces, edges and vertices.

In Pattern & Algebra, students will understand:

- Continue a pattern as a predictable arrangement of elements, e.g. numbers, letters, shapes, objects, colours.
- Describe patterns with numbers and identify missing elements
- Solve problems by using number sentences for addition or subtraction

#### Investigations and Religious Education

#### Let's go on a journey: The history of Mitcham.

This term students will be investigating the history of significant people, buildings/sites and the natural environment in Mitcham. They will research using books and digital technologies to discover what it may reveal about the past. We are hoping to go on a number of local walks to discover these places of historic interest to Mitcham. We will begin this unit by looking at how students and their families commemorate past events that are important to them, such as Easter, Anzac Day and Welcome to Country. This links with our RE unit 'Church and Community' where students will learn about the significance of family meals and gatherings in relation to the traditions of the Church.

Students will begin the term by learning about Easter.

In Easter, students will learn about:

- The season of Easter.
- Times in the scriptures when Jesus appeared to his disciples after his resurrection.
- The story of the Ascension.
- The story of Pentecost.
- The symbols of Pentecost, eg. Holy Spirit, wind and fire.

#### Social and Emotional Learning

In Social and Emotional Learning we will be learning about Social Management. We will take part in a number of activities, role plays and circle times centred on positive coping and ways to manage our feelings

### Term 2 Newsletter-3/4

#### Term 2

#### History: Journey-What moments that shape us?

In Inquiry this term we will be focussing on History and the role that people of diverse backgrounds have played in how Australia is shaped today. Our unit will include the following:

-Students reflect on their own individual journeys and timelines and what has shaped who they are today.

Research into a timeline of key events in Australia's history and how that has shaped us as a country.

-Exploration into Australia's history of immigration.

-Research project on a significant person who has shaped Australian society.

In reflection on our unit, we will be going to the Immigration Museum on Thursday 29th of June. The excursion will involve a presentation titled "Pack your Bags". This will be an interactive presentation which allows students to explore migration and cultural diversity through stories told with objects, artefacts and costumes.

#### Literacy

In Term 2 Writing, we will be looking closely at the 6+1 traits both individually and as a collective. These traits are part of an instructional and assessment model that focuses on the key elements and attributes that define a quality piece of writing. These are:

Ideas—The main message

Organisation—The internal structure of the piece

Voice—The personal tone and flavor of the author's message

Word Choice—The vocabulary a writer chooses to convey meaning

Sentence Fluency—The rhythm and flow of the language

Conventions—The mechanical correctness

Presentation—How the writing actually looks on the page

In reading groups, students will engage in a range of comprehension, spelling and handwriting activities. We will be further utilising Reading Eggspress through weekly comprehension tasks individually set for students to complete during reading rotations. We will also be having additional focus groups on inferencing, looking at what it means "to read between the lines" and gain an understanding of a text which goes beyond the literal meaning.

#### **Religious Education**

#### Easter

In this Easter season, we continue exploring the Easter stories and what it means to be Easter people. Easter stories will include Holy Thursday, Good Friday, Easter Sunday, the Road to Emmaus and Pentecost.

#### Kev Figures in the Church

Linking with our Inquiry unit, we will be exploring the history of the Catholic Church in Australia and how it has changed over time. Included in this, we will be exploring the influence of key figures in our church history such as Mary Mackillop, Pope Francis and Mother Teresa. Students will be writing a biography on one of these key figures and reflect on how they have impacted on the Catholic Church as it is today.

Eucharist - Exploring Jesus' Presence

Supporting our Sacramental program, students will examine the origins of the Eucharist in the Passover and the Last Supper. Students will then investigate the parts of the Mass and the symbols, signs and rituals in each part. They will be given the opportunity to consider the significance of the Mass in their own lives.

#### Mathematics

Through independent, small and large group activities students will explore the following concepts; Time

Practise telling the time in analogue and digital format and introduce 24 hour time. Recognise that there are 60 seconds in a minute, 60 minutes in a hour, 24 hours in a day. Estimate and calculate the time required to perform tasks. Solve problems involving timelines and timetables including elapsed time.

#### Fractions

Model, count and represent fractions on a number line including improper fractions. Investigate equivalent fractions and compare and order fractions according to value.

#### Two Dimensional Shapes and Angles

Compare and describe two dimensional shapes (polygons) using properties including the measurement of interior and exterior angles in degrees.

#### Mass

Estimate using hefting, order, compare and measure objects mass using scaled instruments. Convert between units of grams, kilograms and tonnes.

#### Two Dimensional Shapes and Angles

Compare and describe two dimensional shapes (polygons) using properties including the measurement of interior and exterior angles in degrees.

#### Multiplication

Recall multiplication facts up to 10 X10. Develop efficient mental and written strategies for multiplication and division where there is no reminder. Understand the relationship between multiplication and division

#### Social and Emotional Learning

This term we will be looking at positive coping strategies and stress management strategies that will help students deal with difficult emotional situations.

#### Positive Coping:

Activities within this topic area will assist students to:

-Investigate how emotional responses vary in depth and strength

 -Identify and describe strategies to manage and moderate emotions in a range of familiar and unfamiliar situations

-Learn and practice self-calming techniques

#### Emotions Management:

Activities within this topic area assist students to:

-Describe the influence that people, situations and events have on their emotions

-Explore strategies to manage physical, social and emotional change

-Describe and apply strategies that can be used in situations that make them feel uncomfortable or unsafe

-Explain the value of self-discipline and goal-setting in helping them to learn and to with change and challenge -Describe personal strengths and identify coping strategies that they can apply to help them cope with change

and challenge

#### Home Learning

-We encourage daily reading at home. This should include both independent reading and reading aloud. Furthermore, discussions about the characters and storyline can help students make connections and develop deeper understandings of what they are reading. Students should keep a record of what book they are reading and a signature from an adult in their diaries. -Fortnightly Home Learning sheet.

### Term Two Newsletter - Year Five/Six



Welcome back to the start of Term two. We are looking forward to building on our learning and established routines from first term. We have many fantastic learning opportunities and experiences ahead this term such as Year 5 Camp, inter-school sport, district soccer, an excursion to the Immigration Museum, Naplan and many more.

#### <u>Inquiry</u>

Our second term inquiry unit titled "Journey" will have a strong history focus and be aligned closely with our literacy and Religious Education learning. Students will be exploring Australian history, post Federation. They will investigate significant events, individuals and groups that influenced change to Australian society since Federation. The unit will allow for students to gain a better understanding of the role we can have in shaping and changing our community. As part of this unit of learning students will be visiting the Immigration Museum in the city to learn about the stories of specific people and groups that have migrated to our country.



#### **Religious Education**

Students will be exploring their own faith journey in Religious Education and the place of sacraments and scripture in their lives. We continuing to examine the easter stories and what it means to be Easter people.

All other school dates will be in the St John's School Calendar and regularly in the school newsletter.



#### <u>English</u>

This term, the senior students will look to develop their reading, speaking and listening and writing skills through a variety of activities and programs.

Our literacy rotation activities and teacher lead focus groups will continue this term to develop student reading skills.

Towards the end of this term, all students will begin a public speaking program, "My Best Speech," facilitated by an organisation called, "Trained to Speak." Students will participate in workshops that focus on writing a public speech that uses effective language, voice and movement.

In writing students will continue to explore the "6 + 1 Writing Traits" with a particular focus on 'conventions' (punctuation, spelling, capitalisation, paragraphing & grammar) and 'sentence fluency'. Our text focus for this term will centre around writing persuasive and biographical texts.

#### Maths

The following curriculum topics will be taught this term:

- Whole numbers: Addition and subtraction
- Space: Tessellations and transformations
- Measurement: Area
- Fractions and decimals
- Number Patterns

#### Home Learning

We are noticing an improvement in the quality of learning being submitted and organisational skills developing. We thank you for your support with this and ask you to continue to check diaries and that nightly reading is recorded. We also welcome any feedback related to home learning to help us provide effective and appropriate learning for the home environment.

#### Timetable

Specialist classes of Performing Arts and Italian are on Wednesday,

Students will need to wear sports uniform on Fridays and Tuesday (5/6TJ) and Wednesday (5/6MO).

Library borrowing will continue to take place on Mondays.

Inter-school sport will run on Friday afternoons during Term 2, beginning on the 5th of May.

#### Learning Conferences

This term we will be conducting 10 minute learning conferences with each student. The purpose of these conferences is to discuss progress, learning goals and provide feedback on learning. Students will identify what has worked well (WWW) and an area for improvement -even better if (EBI) on general school attitude and behaviour.

Tournament of Minds Tournament of Minds is coming to St John's as a part of our Extension Educa-

Tournament of Minds is a problem solving program for teams of students from both primary and secondary years. They are required to solve demanding, open-ended challenges from one of the following disciplines:

Science Technology **Engineering Mathematics** Social Sciences Language Literature

Tournament of Minds is an opportunity for students with a passion for learning and problem solving to demonstrate their skills and talents in an exciting, vibrant and public way.

Contued:-

Teams of 7 - 8 students (from Years 4 - 6) are required to work together on a *Long Term Challenge* for six weeks at school, without assistance from teachers, parents or peers. They are encouraged to explore possibilities and experiment with ideas as they endeavour to produce their best possible solution. They develop a creative and original way to communicate this solution to others, working within predefined parameters such as limited materials, complex challenge criteria and the deadline of Tournament Day.

Students present the product of their ideas - their challenge solution - to a panel of judges and an audience on Tournament Day. They have ten minutes in which to present and must do so within a 3 metre by 3 metre performance area.

The teams must also participate in an unseen *Spontaneous Challenge* on Tournament Day. This challenge requires rapid interchange of ideas, the ability to think creatively and well developed group cooperation skills. Tournament Day is either 19<sup>th</sup> or 20<sup>th</sup> August at Deakin University Burwood.
