St John's Primary School Attendance Policy Statement

Rationale

To ensure all children of compulsory school age who are enrolled at St John's attend school every day that the school is open for instruction.

In accordance with the Education and Training Reform Act 2006, schooling is compulsory for children and young people aged from 6 – 17 years unless an exemption has been granted.

Students are expected to attend the school in which they are enrolled, during normal school hours every day of each term, unless:

• there is an approved exemption from school attendance or attendance and enrolment for the student, The principal may authorise an exemption and provide written approval for student attendance or attendance and enrolment to be exempt or reduced to less than full time.

For absences where there is no exemption in place, the parent/guardian must promptly provide an explanation on each occasion to the school. The school will determine if the explanation provided is a reasonable excuse for the purposes of the parent meeting their responsibilities under the Education and Training Reform Act 2006.

All schools, including St John's, must maintain attendance records, identify and follow up unexplained absences, and develop policies to support and maintain attendance.

<u>Aims</u>


- To ensure school attendance is maximised and records are accurately kept.
- To comply with legal obligations (Victorian Government Legislation)

Implementation:

- The attendance roll is to be marked by the classroom teacher on the class list and sent to the office in the office bag and also electronically. This is done twice a day at 9:30am and 3:00pm. The reason for the absence must be recorded by the teacher according to the given codes.
- Parents have been informed in the Parent Handbook and school newsletter that they are to notify the school of a child's absence before 8:45 am. Parents or guardians may either email staff, send an app notification, leave a message at the office or write a note.
- Absence notes are to be retained by the teacher and these are archived at the conclusion of each school year.
- Office administration staff accept phone calls from parents and print out app notifications. These are passed on immediately to teachers..
- Unexplained absences are addressed automatically by the nForma roll program via email to parents before 10:00am. If still no contact is made by the parent after the email has been sent, the Principal/Deputy Principal will make contact.

Religious Education:

This term students will learn about all the wonderful things in our world that God has created. They will represent their thoughts about Creation through artwork, small group discussions, role plays, oral presentations and by reflecting on stories from the bible. We will be linking our Religious Education to our Inquiry unit about Science and Sustainability and how we have a very important role to respect and care for the world we live in. This term students will also be learning about what it means to be a disciple of Jesus and how to show compassion like Jesus did. We will be listening to more stories from the bible, both from the Old and New testaments to deepen this understanding.

English:

Shop

We will continue our Reading Groups this term followed by Writing. Thank you to those who have offered to help in the classroom. It is greatly appreciated. Readers will continue to be sent home each night. Please return these to school each day so we can continue to have a wide range of texts to read. This term we will be looking closer into different text types and talking even more about what we are reading by thinking about what is not explicitly stated. We will be moving beyond known strategies. such as looking at the picture and the first letter, and learning how to engage further with what we are reading by using multiple strategies when it doesn't make sense. Please continue to utilise the Reading Eggs program at home to further support your child's progress.

Mathematics:

This term the Preps will be introduced to the Mathletics program at school. I encourage you to utilise this program at home a few times per week to consolidate what students are learning at school. We will be focusing on these topics this term:

Addition - Modelling, articulating and justifying how numbers can be added together in multiple ways. We will work on using our knowledge of friends of ten and double facts to solve problems.

Subtraction - understanding how quantities and numbers can be taken away from collections. We will learn the word 'difference' and that there are many words that can mean something is subtracted.

Sharing - sharing equally between groups (early division concepts that are strongly linked to multiplication and repeated addition) 2D Shape/3D Objects - sorting, describing and comparing 2D shapes and 3D objects in our

Length - using informal units to compare lengths. We will be introduced to measuring and how we need to measure correctly for an accurate result.

Inquiry - Science and Sustainability:

Our Inquiry topic this term is all about Science and Sustainability and will help students learn about where their waste goes and how it doesn't just disappear when it falls on the floor or into a bin. Students will learn about recycling and how to rethink what they are personally doing so they can make a positive impact on the environment. Together with the Year 1s and 2s, we will be going on an excursion to link in with this unit.

Social and Emotional Learning:

Our focus this term in Social and Emotional Learning will be on Social Awareness. Students will learn the importance of seeking help from trusted adults when problems are too big to solve on their own or they unsafe. The Preps will explore how to recognise when others may be in need of a friend and what they can do to help. We will be discussing the importance of doing what is right, even if no one is doing it and having a big emphasis on our own self-talk and positive coping strategies.

Term 3!

Welcome to Term 3! The first half of the year has flown by and we can't wait for another term of learning. We hope you enjoyed looking at your child's portfolios over the break. It would be fantastic if you could start bringing these back so we can add new rich pieces of learning.

Religious Education & Inquiry

Our RE and Inquiry focus this term is on Wonder - how has this come to be? With a science lense, students will be investigating the effects of rubbish on our school, community and world. We will brainstorm and create ways we can make a difference in reusing, reducing and recycling within the school. As inspiration, we will be going on an excursion to CERES. CERES stands for: Centre for Research and Environmental studies. It is a Sustainability Centre which provides learning programs on how to create environmentally beneficial choices. We're sure it will provide us with lots of ideas on how we can make St John's a more environmentally sustainable community!

Our RE unit will be closely linked with this idea, through a focus on caring for God's creation. Students will engage in the Catholic Social Teaching - Stewardship of Creation. This will involve exploring the creation story and reflecting on how and why we need to take care of our environment in order to be responsible Stewards of Creation.



English

In writing we will spend a number of weeks learning about information writing. Students will learn the features of scientific reports and procedures and how we can use graphic organisers to present our ideas. Students will have the opportunity to write animal fact files including habitat, food, features etc. In linking with writing we will explore the difference between fiction and non-fiction and learn about their features. Our big book foci will be non-fiction texts.

In reading group rotations we will continue to have a focus group on decoding strategies, another focus group on comprehension and students will be introduced to some new iPad apps and computer programs. We will also have an oral language focus weekly and students will participate in a range of activities which focus on speaking on full sentences and using appropriate tenses. In spelling we will continue to learn about blends, silent letters, syllables and visual memory to spell familiar and unfamiliar words.

Mathematics

In Maths we will be consolidating our numeracy skills in a number of areas and learning new concepts. This term we will be learning more about the five following areas:

-<u>Subtraction:</u> taking away from a collection using part to part and part to whole separations, linking in closely with addition.

 -<u>Multiplication:</u> linking to repeated addition and concept of equal groups.

-<u>Division:</u> recognising that the number in each group is the same and there can be leftovers.

-<u>Time:</u> telling the time to the hour, half past, quarter past and quarter to.

-<u>Mass:</u> using informal and formal means to determine what is heavier.

We will be beginning our maths sessions with skip counting. We are growing our confidence to skip count by 2s, 5s and 10s forwards and backwards from various starting points and will begin exploring counting by 3s and 4s. Students will also be taking part in place value activities such as choosing a number from the hundreds chart and asking what is 1 more than this number? 1 less? 10 more? 20 less? 100 more? It is very important that your child continues to complete the assigned tasks on Mathletics, as it is reinforcement for what is being taught in the classroom.



Social & Emotional Learning

Our SEL focus for Term 3 is on Social Awareness. This will involve recognising how we can ask for help when we need it and listing the people we can turn to when we need help. By looking at different problem based scenarios, we will identify the ways we can help our friends when a problem arises. We will also be exploring our individual uniqueness. This will involve lessons on why we should not label others based on stereotypes because we all have individual differences.





Home Learning

Reading Eggs - We recommend 15 minutes at least three times a week. This includes assigned Reading Eggs activities which will be a combination of comprehension and spelling tasks.

Mathletics - We recommend Mathletics practice at home at least three times a week to help consolidate maths learning in the classroom. Tasks will be assigned on weeks where new topics have been introduced.

Daily reading and recording in reading records.

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ST JOHN'S MITCHAM 3/4 NEWSLETTER – TERM 3

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

Mary

Students will explore the concept of discipleship through an exploration of Mary. They will learn about Mary as the Christian model of discipleship through an analysis of the scripture and the ways in which we can live as a disciple today.

Prayer

Students will explore prayer as a way of communicating with God. They will be investigating the examples of Jesus praying in Luke's Gospel and research prayer practices in the school and Church community.

ENGLISH

In Term 3 writing, we will begin by looking at the 6+1 Writing Trait of Voice before working on Information and Explanation pieces to link with our Science Inquiry unit. Students will learn effective techniques and structures to make their writing more compelling to their audience. Students will be having a focus on structure and incorporating factual information in their writing. In reading groups, students will engage in a range of comprehension, spelling and writing activities. We will be further utilising Reading Eggspress through wee kly comprehension tasks individually set for students to complete during reading rotations. We will also be having additional focus groups on Readers' Theatre and opinion writing in response to a text.



MATHEMATICS

Through independent, small and large group activities students will explore the following concepts; Area

Solve and compare the areas of two dimensional shapes using metric units. Understand how multiplication is used to find the area of two dimensional shapes.

Time

Practise telling the time in analogue and digital format and introduce 24 hour time. Recognise that there are 60 seconds in a minute, 60 minutes in a hour, 24 hours in a day. Estimate and calculate the time required to perform tasks. Solve problems involving timelines and timetables including elapsed time.

Fractions and Decimals

Count, order and represent fractions and decimals on a number line. Investigate equivalent fractions and make connections between fractions and decimals.



3D Objects and Volume

Describe the properties of 3D shapes. Compare the volume of 3 dimensional objects using centicubes and litres.

Pattern and Algebra


Explore repeating and growing patterns. Find and use functions rules to solve simple problems (input/output machines). Understand that the = sign represents "the same as".

WONDER - SAVING OUR LOCALS (INQUIRY & STEM)

In term 3, students will be developing a greater understanding of Australian animals, their habitats and survival adaptations through the lens of sustainability. We will capture students' interest and find out about plants and animals, their life cycles and how they depend on each other and the environment to survive.

After researching, students will be posed with the following challenge: "Animals in captivity are struggling when released into the wild because their habitats are not realistic."

Students will be challenged to create natural habitats in captivity (e.g. zoos) to ensure the species survival in the future through breeding and release programs.



SEL

This term in SEL students will be focusing on Social Awareness. This will involve looking at identity, gender and help seeking strategies. Students will be identifying similarities and differences between individuals and groups in a respectful manner and identifying the importance of including others in our activities, groups and games.

HOME LEARNING

We encourage daily reading at home. This should include both independent reading and reading aloud. Furthermore, discussions about the characters and storyline can help students make connections and develop deeper understandings of what they are reading. Students should keep a record of what book they are reading and a signature from an adult in their diaries.

-Fortnightly Home Learning sheet.

-Ongoing Mathletics tasks will be set for students to complete at home. These tasks will relate to what has been covered in class and assist students in consolidating what they have learnt.

-Reading Eggspress practice at home will assist students develop their literacy skills. The program provides a library of books, lessons and English skills practice.

Term Three Newsletter – Year 5/6







Welcome back to the start of Term Three!

Looking back on Term Two it is great to think about the wonderful learning experiences our students had and the exciting programs they were involved in. Some highlights include inter-school sports, Year Five camp to Sovereign Hill, our Debating Program, Confirmation, District Soccer and Cross Country.

We are excited for the learning opportunities ahead and some of the experiences students will be involved in during Term 3. These include the Tournament of Minds program, District Athletics, Hooptime Basketball, our Interfaith Excursion, an excursion to Edendale where students will learn about sustainable energy and also our Term 3 STEM (Science Technology Engineering Mathematics) inquiry unit of learning.





Religious Education

Linking our inquiry learning closely with Religious Education students will be looking at their role as "Stewards of Creation" and how their choices impact the world. We are very fortunate to be involved in another interfaith excursion this term, where we will visit various places of worship in our local Whitehorse community. Students will get the chance to learn about the similarities and differences in various faith traditions and continue to build appreciation and respect towards other groups in our community.

English

This term, the senior students will look to develop their reading, speaking and listening and writing skills through a variety of activities and programs.

Our literacy rotation activities and teacher lead focus groups will continue this term to develop student reading skills through a variety of texts types, word study activities (vocabulary, spelling, punctuation and grammar), and online activities (BTN study and Reading Eggs).

In writing students will continue to explore the "6 + 1 Writing Traits" with a particular focus on 'organisation'. Our text focus for this term will centre around recount and narrative writing.

Mathematics

The following curriculum topics will be taught this term:

- Number & Algebra: Pattern and Algebra
 - Students will describe, continue and create patterns with fractions and decimals. They will
 use equivalent number sentences to find unknown quantities, explore the use of brackets



and order of operations to write number sentences. Students will also follow and design a mathematical algorithm involving repetition.

- Number & Algebra: Multiplication
 - Students will use factors and multiples of whole numbers to solve problems, multiply large numbers by one- or two-digit numbers using efficient mental, written strategies and appropriate digital technologies.
- Measurement & Geometry: Time
 - Students will explore timetables, measure elapsed time and compare 12- and 24-hour time systems and convert between them.
- Number & Algebra: Fractions and decimals
 - Students will focus on decimals through this unit of work and recognise that the place value system can be extended beyond hundredths. They will compare, order and represent decimals, add and subtract decimals, and use estimation and rounding to check the reasonableness of answers. Students will explore multiplying decimals by powers of 10 and other whole numbers.
- Statistics and Probability: Data
 - Students will pose questions and collect categorical or numerical data by observation or survey. They will construct displays with and without the use of digital technologies and describe and interpret different data sets in context.

Inquiry

Our third term inquiry unit titled "Wonder" will have a strong sustainability focus and be aligned closely with our literacy and Religious Education learning. Students will be exploring sustainable energy resources. They will investigate the energy sources that are widely used and explore how these can be improved for future generations.

SEL (Social and Emotional Learning)

This term our SEL focus will centre around social awareness. As part of this students will be exploring different ways we can manage problems with our friends and families and who to turn to when you need help.

Timetable

Specialist classes of Performing Arts and Italian will continue on Wednesdays. Students will need to wear sports uniform on Thursday and Fridays.

Home Learning

Home learning will continue again this semester with students beginning this in Week 2. We appreciate the fantastic support from all families as we look to build student's time management and organisational skills.


