#### Parking



#### Our Gospel Challenge this week is to: listen to others carefully!

Jesus came to a village, and a woman named Martha welcomed him into her house. She had a sister called Mary, who sat down at the Lord's feet and listened to him speaking. Now Martha who was distracted with all the serving said, 'Lord, do you not care that my sister is leaving me to do the serving all by myself? Please tell her to help me.' But the Lord answered: 'Martha, Martha,' he said 'you worry and fret about so many things, and yet few are needed, indeed only one. It is Mary who has chosen the better part; it is not to be taken from her.' (Luke 10:38–42)



On our first reading of this text, many of us would feel sympathy with Martha, who is left to do all the work. But a more careful reading of the text uncovers the real problem. Martha is ready 'to welcome Jesus into her house'. And yet she becomes so preoccupied with the fuss of getting food ready that she is failing to do exactly what she set out to do: offer welcome to the person of Jesus. Mary, on the other hand, is attentive to the words and teachings of Jesus. Who has offered the true welcome? The responses of these two women are not in opposition, but rather indicate two ways of acting that should become integrated in how we relate to others: attentive friendship and generous and practical service. The gospel of the Good Samaritan from last week shows us a model of selfless service. Here we are presented with the other side of the story: the need to also be attentive and to listen to the word of God so that we don't get caught up in activities and preoccupations that are ultimately not important. **How can we be more attentive, generous and serve others? Do we make it a priority to stop in the busyness of life to listen and reflect on scripture?**

During Social and Emotional Learning the past two terms, students have been focusing on their emotions and personal strengths. This term, our SEL focus goes beyond students thinking about their own thoughts and feelings and onto their social awareness. Social awareness is about respecting diversity of others, the

#### Professional Learning Meetings (PLMs)

Every Tuesday and Wednesday afternoon St. John's staff have attended Professional learning meetings (PLMs). These PLMs relate directly to our Annual Action Plan and provide rich professional learning as we grow and develop shared understandings. PLMs are led by our leadership team members across all spheres - Leadership and Management, Learning and Teaching, Student Wellbeing and Religious Dimension.

#### PLMs we ran last term included:

- Nationally Consistent Collection of Data (NCCD) Portal and Learning Diversity
- The Social Processes of Writing Karen Crennan
- Writing Strategies and Structure Karen Crennan
- Coaching: Junior team-Reading/Senior team-Mathematics
- School improvement plan (SIP) Pedagogies/Visible Learning
- Digital technologies
- Berry Street Character
- Inquiry
- NCCD planning

#### Professional learning

During the term a number of staff members attended professional learning days and network days and undertook professional courses online in their own time. We feel it is important to share an overview of what staff members have been learning with the school community.

#### Eastern Region eLearning Network (Thomas Jackson)

The purpose of these workshops were to provide a hands-on opportunity to review our school's cybersafety processes, policies and documentation. The goal is to give leaders an opportunity to examine their current documents, share and compare with others (and the CEM) and see whether any modifications are required for 2020.

#### Eastern Region Deputy Principal Network (Monica O'Shannassy)

This network day had a focus on gaining knowledge from Dr Lyn Sharratt share her experience of improving schools and systems through leadership grounded in contemporary evidence based research. We explored high impact learning environments which unite and empower educators to improve student, school, system and organisational outcomes.

#### The Learning Collaborative

(Kellie Cumming, Jacqui Marshall, Naomi Curtis, Ange Crowe and Monica O'Shannassy) The focus of this network day was for Dr Lyn Sharratt (ER Critical Friend) will facilitate our vision in the Eastern Region Learning Collaborative for school leaders and teachers to develop the confidence and capability to identify, contextualise and embed highly effective practices that improve student learning outcomes.

#### Literacy and Numeracy network (Naomi Curtis, Ange Crowe, Kellie Cumming)

The purpose of the day was to network with other leaders in our networks and to explore ways to effectively implement change in our leadership roles within the school.

#### Berry Street Education Model: Character (Kristina Reid)

The purpose of this day was for school teams to develop a greater understanding of the strategies needed to support character and strength recognition in students.

#### Eastern Region Combined Leaders Network (Kristina Reid and Monica O'Shannassy)

The focus of this day was to link Victorian Curriculum with RE curriculum being taught in the classroom.

#### NCCD network (Monica O'Shannassy)

This network day had a focus on ensuring while schools were conducting internal moderation processes, CECV provided the opportunity for moderation sessions for schools and provide specialist staff to consult with. The briefing aimed to provide further clarity to schools regarding submission processes and opportunity to respond to questions.

#### School Governors and Principals Briefing (Monica O'Shannassy)

The Parish Priest and Principal Briefing was an opportunity for Parish Priests and primary and secondary principals to gather together to hear important updates regarding Catholic education in the Archdiocese of Melbourne.

#### Empathy, Ethics and Animals (Kristina Reid)

The focus of this day was to develop a greater understanding of how we can address ethics in education through discussions involving animals. It also explored what we can do as a community to be able to support organisations, like Zoos Victoria, to ensure that students are taking steps to be ethically conscious in their decision making as they grow.

Some actions that have been undertaken within the school as a result of our learning have included changing our practises in the classroom and planning based on the research of Dr Lyn Sharratt. These practises will continue to evolve through continued conversations and professional development throughout the school. We have also spent some time working on collecting and moderating our NCCD data with greater precision and a more refined process. Our learning sprints have provided all teachers an opportunity to focus their attention on specific learning needs in students and assist in developing their understanding in a small group setting. Berry Street encouraged us to continue to use brain breaks and positive primers throughout the school. We have also changed our planning practises to plan our RE with our inquiry before the commencement of a unit of learning so the integration of these topics can be delivered in a more cohesive manner. Through this planning, we are using provocations (images, multimedia, phrases which elicit conversations) and providing students with background information (different perspectives) to help them have deeper conversations.



# Prep Term 3

#### Religious Education:

In Religious Education this term the Preps will be learning about Creation and how to generate prayers of thanks and praise. They will learn the rituals and practices of prayer and the sacred objects found in the Church.

#### Maths

In addition to our daily work on counting, we will be developing skills in the following areas: Multiplication: understanding the process of equal groups, leftovers and repeated addition.

Subtraction: understanding how quantities and numbers can be taken away from collections and the 'difference' between numbers. Sharing: sharing equally between groups (early division concepts that are strongly

linked to multiplication). 2D Shape and 3D Objects: sorting, comparing

and describing shapes and objects in our environment.

Length: using informal units to compare and measure lengths.

#### English

Students will continue to develop their English skills this term with a greater focus on blends, digraphs, oral language, sentence structure and text types. In Reading, our groupings will be flexible to address particular needs such as comprehension, vocabulary, high frequency words and inferencing. To link in with our Inquiry, we will be learning more explicitly about non-fiction texts, in particular information reports. Students will be exposed to a greater variety of authors and writing styles and will be taught how to write for a particular purpose, for example, to entertain, to persuade or to inform.

#### Inquiry

As always, our Inquiry unit ties in with Religious Education. This term our Inquiry has a Science focus and students will explore the Earth and Space strand. Students will be investigating the Earth's resources, in particular, water, and how it is needed in multiple ways. The Preps will learn about drought and flood and the impact of these natural disasters on how we live.





#### Social and Emotional Learning

Our SEL focus in Term 3 is on Social Management. The Preps will cover topics related to seeking help and reducing stereotypes of what boys and girls can do. We will continue to explore and role play positive interactions between friends and peers.

#### Welcome to Term 3!

After a busy Term 2, we hope your children are well rested after the holidays and can't wait to engage in another term of learning!


#### Religious Education and Inquiry

Within Religious Education we will be looking at stewardship of creation and the world that we live in. We will be reflecting on God's creations and the actions we can do to better care for the environment.

Alongside creation we shall be looking at the Sacrament of Baptism and exploring the following questions: What is Baptism? How did Jesus welcome children? How do we welcome others into God's family? What are the symbols, rituals, actions and prayers of Baptism?

In Inquiry this term we will be focusing on Earth and Space. We will be exploring Earth's resources with a specific focus around the reasons why we need water in our world and what happens when there is no water. Through this, we will be looking at weather patterns and natural disasters and the impact this has on animals and their habitats.

#### English

In Reading groups, students will continue to engage in a range of literacy activities Examples of activities: focus groups, oral language conversational activities, word identification within sentences, brand new comprehension activities that include different strategies and genre.

Reading boxes for independent reading at home (which are located outside of the classroom) have been changed to incorporate more specific levelling for each individual. A sticker with your child's reading group name is below each box so they know exactly where to borrow from. These books will be updated as each child progresses following our regular reading testing. Reading at home should be enjoyable! Easy is good. Due to this, please speak to your classroom teacher if you feel the books have been too difficult for home reading. Students have been made aware of our high expectations to keep the reading boxes organised!

In writing this term we will be looking at multiple applications for writing linking specifically with an inquiry lens. Looking at content pages, specific sentence structures and glossaries students will be writing scientific reports. We will also continue to focus on handwriting across all curriculum areas, spelling rules and patterns and building stamina for writing through rocket writing.

#### Mathematics

In Maths this term we will be exploring and developing skills in the following areas:

- Subtraction: taking away from a collection using part to part and part to whole separations, linking in closely with addition.
- Multiplication: linking to repeated addition and concept of equal groups.
- Division: recognising that the number in each group is the same and there can be leftovers.
- Time: telling the time to the hour, half past, quarter past and quarter to.
- Mass: using informal and formal means to determine what is heavier.

#### Social and Emotional Learning

Our SEL focus for Term 3 is on Social Awareness. This will involve recognising how we can ask for help when we need it and listing the people we can turn to when we need help. By looking at different problem based scenarios, we will identify the ways we can help our friends when a problem arises. We will also be exploring our individual uniqueness. This will involve lessons on why we should not label others based on stereotypes because we all have individual differences.

#### Home Learning

- Reading Eggs We recommend 15 minutes at least three times a week.
- Mathletics We recommend Mathletics practice at home at least three times a week to help consolidate maths learning in the classroom. Tasks will be assigned on weeks where new topics have been introduced.
- Daily reading and recording in reading records. It is helpful if this includes rich discussions with your child on what the text is about. Questions may include: Why is there a capital letter there? What type of punctuation is this (exclamation mark, comma, full stop etc.)? Who told the story? What was the setting/where did it take place? How might the character have felt when this happened? Does this remind of anything that has happened to you (making connections)?

#### **Religious Education**

#### **Caring for our Common Home**

In RE, we will have a focus on the Catholic Social Teaching Principle - Stewardship. The big questions we will be focusing on is: How do I show respect for creation? This will link closely with our unit of Inquiry. Students will be reflecting on the sacredness of creation and what we can do to protect our environment.

#### Prayer

Students will explore prayer as a way of communicating with God. They will be investigating the explore amples of Jesus praying in Luke's Gospel and research prayer practices in the school and Church community.

#### English



n Term 3 we will be writing creative, short narratives focusing on fresh and interesting ideas and improving our word choices to engage our audience. Later in the term we will be looking at Information and Explanation pieces to link with our Science Inquiry unit. Students will learn effective techniques and structures to make their writing more compelling to their audience. Students will be focusing on structure and incorporating factual information in their writing.

In reading groups, students will continue to work on a range of comprehension, spelling and vocabulary building activities. Students will also be working together on Readers' Theatre to help develop their oral language skills such as expression. Throughout the term we will have a range of sessions that will focus on handwriting and spelling skills and activities.

#### Victorian Reading Challenge

We will be encouraging students to participate in the Victorian Premier's Reading Challenge as daily reading at home is encouraged as part of home learning. At school students are given the opportunity to borrow from the library and participate in reading sessions - DEAR (Drop Everything And Read).

The Premier's Reading Challenge is a great resource to promote reading. To meet the challenge students have until the 6th September to read 15 books. If you need support in accessing and recording this challenging please see your classroom teachers. The link to the website has been emailed to your child.

#### Mathematics

Through independent, small and large group activities students will explore the following concepts Area

Solve and compare the areas of two dimensional shapes using metric units. Understand how multiplication is used to find the area of two dimensional shapes.

#### Location

Use simple scales, legends and directions to interpret information contained in basic maps. Create and interpret simple grid maps to show position and pathways.

#### **Fractions and Decimals**

Count, order and represent fractions and decimals on a number line. Investigate equivalent fractions and make connections between fractions and decimals.

#### 3D Objects and Volume

Describe the properties of 3D shapes. Compare the volume of 3 dimensional objects using centicubes and litres.

#### **Pattern and Algebra**

Explore repeating and growing patterns. Find and use functions rules to solve simple problems (input/output machines). Understand that the = sign represents "the same as".

#### Inquiry

Term 3 STEM Inquiry unit, *Planting an Idea*, examines the important role that plants play in our natural environment. Through this learning students will develop an understanding of the vulnerability of our natural environment because of man made changes and/or natural disasters. Students conduct experiments on plants based on different growing conditions including, flood, drought and no sunlight. To conclude this unit, students will plan, develop and create a digital representation of an environment that has ideal growing conditions for a horticultural environment

#### Social and Emotional Learning (SEL)

This term in SEL students will be focusing on Social Awareness. This will involve looking at identity, gender and help seeking strategies. Students will be identifying similarities and differences between individuals and groups in a respectful manner and identifying the importance of including others in our activities, groups and games.

#### **Home Learning**

We encourage daily reading at home. This should include both independent reading and reading aloud. Furthermore, discussions about the characters and storyline can help students make connections and develop deeper understandings of what they are reading.

Students should keep a record of what book they are reading and a signature from an adult in their diaries.

-Fortnightly Home Learning sheet.

-Ongoing Mathletics tasks will be set for students to complete at home. These tasks will relate to what has been covered in class and assist students in consolidating what they have learnt.



-Reading Eggspress practice at home will assist students develop their literacy skills. The program provides a library of books, lessons and English skills practice.

### Term Three Newsletter Year 5/6

Welcome back to the start of Term Three!

Looking back on Term Two it is great to think about the incredible learning experiences our students had and the exciting programs they were involved in. Some highlights included inter-school sports, Year Five camp to Sovereign Hill, our school production, District Soccer, the excursion to the Museum of Chinese Australian History and the Melbourne Zoo.

We are excited for the learning opportunities ahead and some of the experiences students will be involved in during Term 3 such as the Tournament of Minds program, District Athletics, Hooptime Basketball, an excursion to Scienceworks to learn about climate change as part of our inquiry unit of learning for this term.

#### <u>English</u>

This term, the senior students will look to develop their reading, speaking and listening and writing skills through a variety of activities and programs.

Our literacy rotation activities and teacher lead focus groups will continue this term to develop student reading skills through a variety of text types, word study activities (vocabulary, spelling, punctuation and grammar), and online activities (BTN study and Reading Eggs).

In writing students will continue to explore the "6 + 1 Writing Traits" with a particular focus on 'sentence fluency'. Our text focus for this term will centre around information reports and factual writing, such as newspaper reports and instructional texts.

#### **Religious Education**

Linking our inquiry learning closely with Religious Education students will be looking at their role as "Stewards of Creation" and how their choices impact the world. This topic links with the Catholic Social teaching of 'Care for our Common Home' where students will explore the importance of caring for God's creation and sharing the world's resources and wonders with all. With Confirmation this term our students will also be learning about the Gifts and Fruits of the Holy Spirit and how they can be used in our daily lives.

#### SEL (Social and Emotional Learning)

This term our SEL focus will centre around the topic of help seeking. As part of this students will be exploring different ways we can manage problems with our friends and families and who to turn to when you need help.









- Students will connect 3D shapes to their nets and other 2D representations.
- Students will construct simple prisms and pyramids.
- Number & Algebra: Fractions and decimals

• Students will focus on decimals through this unit of work and recognise that the place value system can be extended beyond hundredths. They will compare, order and represent decimals, add and subtract decimals, and use estimation and rounding to check the reasonableness of answers. Students will explore multiplying decimals by powers of 10 and other whole numbers.

- Statistics and Probability: Data
- Students will pose questions and collect categorical or numerical data by observation or sur-

vey. They will construct displays with and without the use of digital technologies and describe and interpret different data sets in context.

#### <u>Inquiry</u>

Our third term inquiry unit titled "Celebrating and nurture curiosity" will have a strong Earth and Space Science focus and be aligned closely with our literacy and Religious Education learning. Students will be exploring climate change and its impact on extreme weather events such as floods, earthquakes, tsunamis and bushfires. On Thursday the 25th of July our students will visit Scienceworks to participate in a program titled 'Our Living Climate'. This program looks closely at our planets in the solar system and how our climate first evolved and how it has been transformed by weather patterns and new life forms.


