Catholic Education Melbourne School Improvement Surveys (CEMSIS): 2-20 September 2019

Throughout each year, we pause to listen to our students, families and staff to gauge how our learning community is travelling. This feedback is invaluable to our progress as an effective school community when combined with evidence-based research and best practices.

One of the more important formal ways we engage and gather data is through CEMSIS, the Catholic Education Melbourne School Improvement Surveys.

CEMSIS is a set of surveys that have been built specifically for Catholic Schools in Melbourne by Learning Services teams at Catholic Education Melbourne in partnership with researchers at Learning First and in wide consultation with Principals in our schools.

In 2019, students, families and staff are invited to participate in CEMSIS using our brand new, secure and purpose-built online platform. The online platform is where our school leaders will access the summary reports that visualise the results of the student, family and staff surveys.

The CEMSIS survey platform is operated by an independent supplier, ORIMA Research Pty Ltd. The platform meets with the very high security and privacy standards for handling student and school data. Participating schools are in the process of updating their privacy policy to ensure school communities are fully informed and protected.

Students at our school will be provided with supervised sessions where teachers will be on hand to help and answer any questions. Families and staff can complete the survey anytime over the three week window via an emailed link and password. Feedback from last year's pilot trials indicate many surveys were done across a range of mobile devices and different web browsers. Schools will be providing more information about CEMSIS throughout Term 2 and 3 via newsletters and social media.

Our community's opinions are critical to understanding how our school is performing – CEMSIS is a key data source for quiding the ongoing work to improve our school.

All participation is invited, welcomed and 100% voluntary. The surveys are not a test; they are an inclusive way of providing feedback and supplement the work we are already doing to improve our school. Everyone has the right to refuse to participate, or withdraw from the survey at any point before, during, or after completion of the survey. Please notify the school if your child does not wish to participate.

Patrick - Before the ceremony Sherry told us about the history of the Aboriginal people. She talked about how the Aborigines had lived through three ice ages. Sherry also told us that they had lived with megafauna, the megafauna hunted them and the aboriginals hunted the megafauna with rocks, hammers & spears.

Maeve- During the ceremony all of the FIRE Carries got a chance to read an Aboriginal script. Aidan read what the Aboriginal Father and the Son was. We all read in front of the fire which Sherry created.

Jess- Sherry placed her hands over the fire and then put them on our ears, eyes, head, heart and hands. Sherry commissioned us, Mrs Marshall and Monica. We are looking forward to commissioning next year's FIRE carriers.

Aidan - After we were commissioned, we unveiled the art piece that many students at St John's had participated in with the artist Heather. My part of the artwork was the school symbol with fruits in the wings of the eagle and the Latain word 'Viribus' which means strength because St John's is strong in faith and strength is important because a weak community can break apart.

Our Gospel Challenge this week is to: pray the Our Father each day!

In this week's Gospel, Jesus says God doesn't always answer our prayers by giving us what we want. First, Jesus compares God to a person who gives his friend what he needs. Then he says God will answer our prayers by giving us the Holy Spirit.

What do we expect from prayer? Most of us pray for things we want, but God often gives us something we need – the courage and commitment to do God's will in tough times. We might want a good test rest result, but what we need are better study habits. So the answer to our prayer might be a teacher challenging us to work harder. We might pray for God to spare a loved one from an illness. God might answer by strengthening us with the Spirit so we can comfort our sick loved one. We might want a better life for the poor. And God might answer our prayer by calling our attention to an opportunity to serve those on the margins in our community.

Sure, our prayers might work miracles for others. But more often our prayers work miracles in us. *Can you remember a time you were inspired to help someone after praying for him or her?*

To begin the week, on Monday 12th August, the whole school will be involved in an incursion provided by the Science discovery dome.



What is the #1 thing to help keep your family cyber safe?



There are internet filters, settings on apps, age restrictions, websites to avoid and social media to be wary of...but above all of these, the key to keeping your children safe online is COMMUNICATION.

We asked cyber safety educator, psychologist and mother of three, Carley McGauran to share her insights into how communication can help keep your family safe online:

I often get asked by parents what they can do to keep their children safe online. Above all else I continually highlight the importance of communication. Here are 4 tips that evidence suggests will best keep your children safe:

Share their tech interest

Discuss and ask questions about their online activities, just as you would embrace their interest in sport, music or any other extracurricular activity.

Help kids access other support

For lots of reasons children won't always want to talk to parents. Let them know it's okay to talk with other trusted adults, for example teachers, aunts/uncles or <u>Kids Helpline</u>.

Don't overreact

Be "curious not furious" (Lisa Smith from The Peaceful Parent has lots of other great ideas). If children think you'll overreact, this will be a big barrier to them sharing anything with you.

Validate their feelings

Kids need to feel heard (well we all do actually) so comments like "don't be such a drama queen" or "it's not a big deal, don't be ridiculous" will discourage them from talking to you as they feel like you have "dismissed" their feelings. You need to give your children a safe space to explore their feelings. Say things like "Tell me more about what happened" & "How did that make you feel?"

Effective communication also means having the 'tricky' conversations with you children, including cyberbullying, pornography, sending nudes & sexting and unwanted contact (grooming). As challenging as these conversations can feel, you as a parent NEED to open up the dialogue in order to best keep your children safe.
